THE 2010 GIELGUD AWARD CEREMONY A Tribute to F. Murray Abraham

Salutes from Edward Albee, Harold Bloom, Ray Bradbury, Robert Brustein, Ethan Coen, Oskar Eustis, Cynthia Harris, Tom Hulce, Fred Kaufman, Renzo Martinelli, James Shapiro, Jerry Stiller, and Others

We hope you'll join us for a toast to one of the most versatile artists of our time, a man whose portrayal of Antonio Salieri in *Amadeus* earned him an Academy Award for Best Actor in the 1984 film adaptation of Peter Shaffer's celebrated drama. This evocative cinema garnered eight Oscars, among them trophies for Best Picture, Best Screenplay, and Best Director (Milos Forman), plus a Best Actor nomination for Tom Hulce, who depicted Mozart as a frivolous lecher whose genius drove an exasperated rival to homicide.

Mr. Hulce will be only one of the many notables who pay tribute to **F. Murray Abraham** at this year's **GIELGUD** festivities. Also represented, either in person or in messages to be conveyed by other program participants, will be a broad cross-section of the scores of distinguished performers, directors, producers, writers, and social and political leaders with whom Mr. Abraham has been associated. His career has featured key roles in dozens of movies,

Select Seating \$125 Choice Seating \$250 Prime Seating \$500 BLACK TIE among them *The Sunshine Boys* (1975), *All the President's Men* (1976), *Scarface* (1983), *The Name of the Rose* (1986), *Last Action Hero* (1993), *Mighty Aphrodite* (1995), *Looking for Richard* (1996), *Star Trek: Insurrection* (1998), *Finding Forrester* (2000), and *The Bridge of San Luis Rey* (2004), and work with such legends as Sean Connery, Burt Lancaster, Sophia Loren, Al Pacino, and Lina Wertmuller. In Italy Mr. Abraham has completed five pictures with director Renzo Martinelli, among them *The Stone Merchant* (2006) and *Barbarossa* (2009), and other hits with film celebrities like Vittorio Giacci and Giancarlo Giannini. His many theater credits include classics by Aristophanes, John Guare, Arthur Miller, Harold Pinter, Luigi Pirandello, Edmond Rostand, G. B. Shaw, Sam Shepard, and Tennessee Williams, and he has starred in such prestigious vehicles as a Broadway revival of Samuel Beckett's *Waiting for Godot*, directed by Mike Nichols, and a *Theatre for a New Audience* staging of *The Merchant of Venice* that took Mr. Abraham's riveting Shylock to Stratford-upon-Avon as the culminating attraction in the *Royal Shakespeare Company*'s epic *Complete Works* festival.

Mr. Abraham has performed such Bardic roles as Bottom (in a Central Park presentation he wrote about for the Literary Guild edition of *A Midsummer Night's Dream*)

and Malvolio (in a New York Shakespeare Festival mounting of *Twelfth Night*). He has also starred in *King Lear*, *Macbeth, Much Ado About Nothing*, *Othello*, *Richard II*, and *Richard III*. During the spring of 2011 he'll resurrect his 2007 Shylock for a national tour. Mr. Abraham has twice appeared at the White House, and his drama résumé also includes memorable parts in Ethan Coen's *Almost an Evening*, Tony Kushner's *Angels in America*, David Mamet's *Life in the Theatre*, Pierre de Marivaux's *Triumph of Love* (adapted as a Broadway musical), Terrence McNally's *The Ritz*, Theresa Rebeck's *Mauritius*, and Sophocles' *Oedipus Rex*. Television audiences will recall Mr. Abraham's appearances in *Bored to Death* (2009) and *Law & Order: Criminal Intent* (2010). He has appeared as narrator in a number of symphonic concerts, working with such artists as James Levine, Itzhak Perlman, and Gerard Schwarz. And PBS viewers will cherish him as the voice of *Nature*, a revered, long-running WNET series produced by Fred Kaufman and directed by Janice Young.

For this revel the SHAKESPEARE GUILD joins hands with the NATIONAL ARTS CLUB, where it offers monthly SPEAKING OF SHAKESPEARE dialogues, and with the ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION, whose New York



branch has long co-hosted Guild activities. Proceeds will benefit endeavors like the *National Shakespeare Competition*, a widely admired initiative for the edification of students and teachers. If you attended *A Shakespearean Revel at Lincoln Center* in 2002, you relished such personalities as actors John Clesse, Kitty Carlisle Hart, Dana Ivey, and Tony Randall, writer Adam Gopnik, and

directors Bernard Gersten and Margot Harley in a toast to Kevin Kline as that year's recipient of the *Gielgud Award for Excellence in the Dramatic Arts*. It was a joyous occasion, but like its 2003 sequel with Lynn Redgrave as laureate

and her brother CORIN and her sister VANESSA as presenters at the NATIONAL ARTS CLUB, it was also substantive, with remarks not only about the honoree's achievements but about the heritage they illustrate. In this respect it echoed a



1999 gala at Broadway's BARRYMORE THEATRE, where Zoe CALDWELL, who'd won a 1998 GIELGUD at the FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY, led a cavalcade of notables – actors Keith BAX-

TER, BRIAN BEDFORD, HAL HOLBROOK, RONALD PICKUP, CHRISTOPHER PLUMMER, and TOBY STEPHENS, dramatist SIR DAVID HARE, director SIR RICHARD EYRE, *Masterpiece Theatre* producer Rebecca Eaton, and news host Robert MacNeil — in a tribute to Dame Judi Dench. A few months later Dame Judi and another *Gielgud* honoree, SIR DEREK JACOBI, were among the hosts for a 2000 presentation to performer, director, and filmmaker Kenneth Branagh in London's historic Middle Temple Hall. This Bardic *Salute to "The Man of the Millennium"*

featured vignettes by U.S. Ambassador Philip Lader, composer Patrick Doyle, and actors Samantha Bond, Richard Briers, Helena Bonham Carter, Richard Clifford, Ben Elton, Stephen Fry, Bob Hoskins, Geraldine McEwan, and Timothy Spall.

On April 19, 2004, in the London theatre that had been renamed for Sir John in 1994, a few months after the Shakespeare Guild unveiled a gleaming John Safer trophy to perpetuate a gifted actor's legacy "with golden quill" (Sonnet 85), the Guild combined forces with the Royal Shakespeare Company and the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art to celebrate the centenary of Sir John's birth. During an evening hosted by the BBC's Ned Sherrin, playwrights Alan Bennett and Sir David Hare, director Sir Peter Hall, and actors Dame Judi Dench, Clive Francis, Rosemary Harris, Martin Jarvis, Barbara Jefford, Barbara Leigh-Hunt, Sir Ian McKellen, Michael Pennington, Ian Richardson, Paul Scofield, and Sir Donald Sinden commended their late-departed friend. On June 12, 2006, the Guild returned to the National Arts Club for a Manhattan salute to Christopher Plummer, who was toasted by Julie Andrews, Zoe Caldwell, Clive Francis, NAC President Aldon James, Robert MacNeil, Audra McDonald, and Lynn Redgrave. A few months later, on May 21, 2007, the Guild joined the English-Speaking Union at Washington's British Embassy for a reception at which Sir David and Lady Manning, Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg, performers Helen Carey and Ted van Griethuysen, and other leaders feted Michael Kahn, artistic director of the Shakespeare Theatre Company, for his contributions to the cultural life of the Nation's Capital. On March 10, 2008, Sir David's successor, Sir Nigel Sheinwald, joined actors F. Murray Abraham, Kate Fleetwood, Whoopi Goldberg, Joel Grey, and Daniel Stewart, pianist Emanuel Ax, director David Jones, producer Robert Halmi Jr., and other admirers in a Gielgud salute to Patrick Stewart.
