


Mr. Andrews Holding his Plaque from Mayor Janway

A member of CHS's class of 1961, **John F. Andrews** holds degrees from Princeton (A.B. 1965), Harvard (M.A.T. 1966), and Vanderbilt (Ph.D. 1971), and has taught at several universities (among them Florida State and Georgetown). He spent a decade (1974-84) at the Folger Shakespeare Library on Capitol Hill, where he edited *Shakespeare Quarterly*, oversaw an extensive book-publishing operation, and chaired a Renaissance institute that was co-sponsored by more than twenty universities, among them Duke, Johns Hopkins, Virginia, and Yale. Meanwhile he chaired a National Advisory Panel for *The Shakespeare Plays* (a six-year BBC series), hosted a WNET lecture series that aired on NPR, and helped produce *Shakespeare: The Globe and the World*, a popular eight-city touring exhibition. He then helped create *The Shakespeare Hour*, a follow-up PBS series with Walter Matthau as host.

After three years at the National Endowment for the Humanities (1984-87), Mr. Andrews began focusing on projects with Scribners (two 3-volume sets about Shakespeare's world, work, and influence), Doubleday (a Literary Guild edition of the playwright's classics), and Orion (a series of *Everyman Shakespeare* paperbacks). In the early '90s he established The Shakespeare Guild and launched a prestigious award in the name of Sir John Gielgud (with New York ceremonies at the Barrymore Theatre, Lincoln Center, and the National Arts Club, and London festivities at BAFTA, Middle Temple Hall, and the Guildhall), honoring such stars as F. Murray Abraham, Kenneth Branagh, Judi Dench, Derek Jacobi, Kevin Kline, Ian McKellen, Lynn and Vanessa Redgrave, and Patrick Stewart.

Mr. Andrews has written for *The Atlantic, The New York Times,* and *The Washington Post,* and he has appeared on CBS's *Nightwatch with Charlie Rose,* NPR's *All Things Considered* and *Weekend Edition,* PBS's *MacNeil/Lehrer News Hour,* and C-SPAN's weekend *Book TV.* He has lectured not only in Egypt, Japan, and throughout the U.S., but in such U.K. settings as Oxford, Cambridge, and Stratford-upon-Avon. During a July 2000 ceremony at the British Embassy in Washington, he became an O.B.E., an honorary Officer of the British Empire. Five years later, while overseeing the DC Branch of the English-Speaking Union, he helped organize a BBC Radio 4 lecture series to commemorate Alistair Cooke, with Senator John McCain as its inaugural speaker.

Since 2007 Mr. Andrews and his wife, artist Jan Denton, have resided in Santa Fe. They love being back in their native state, and it permits Mr. Andrews not only to serve on the boards of organizations such as the Museum of New Mexico Foundation, but to chair the Mayor's Cultural Development Council in Carlsbad.



- Bob and Barbara Forrest Philanthropists who founded CARC Inc. Bob served as mayor for 16 years.
- Drew Gaffney An astronaut and biomedical researcher who flew on the Space Shuttle.
- Dick Harrell A professional drag racer in the early 1960's and 1970's who was known as "Mr. Chevrolet." Dick set numerous racing records.
- Anna Jane Sitton Hays A writer who is one of the founders of "Sesame Street."
- Jed Howard A historian and teacher who developed the nearlovingsbend net archive.
- Frank Kindel Known as the "Flying Paper Boy of The Guadalupes." He was also a famous community promoter and showman.
- Porfirio Leyva A biology teacher for decades who was known for his famous "digestion lab."
- General Fred K. Mahaffey A four-star general who served as Commander in Chief, United States Readiness Command.
- Roderick Fletcher Mead A painter and printmaker. Mead's best known print series "The Zodiac" fuses science, myth, and nature.
- Lynn Pitcaithley An author, animal lover, and actress who taught school until she was 80.
- Sgt. Alejandro Ruiz A U.S. Congressional Medal of Honor recipient honored for extreme bravery during the battle of Okinawa.
- Dr. Emmitt Smith An educator in Carlsbad who helped integrate local schools, hotels, and restaurants.

- Ira Stockwell A fire chief who ran nearly all of Carlsbad's departments during WWII.
- Becky Thompson A businesswoman and professional basketball player with the All American Redheads. Becky belongs to five halls of fame.
- Sonny Throckmorton A songwriter and singer with more than 1,000 of his songs recorded.
- Linda Wertheimer A news woman with NPR. She hosted the popular program "All Things Considered" and remains a political correspondent.
- Jim White An explorer who helped make Carlsbad Caverns National Park become a popular tourist destination.
- John Wooten Played professional football for the Cleveland Browns and the Washington Redskins.



MORE ON THE MUSEUM







A TRADITION OF LEADERSHIP

The Carlsbad Hall of Fame was first suggested by musician Bill Brooks and members of the Mayor's Cultural Development Council. The city of Carlsbad has a rich history of notable men and women from all walks of life, and the members of the council felt this legacy needed to be celebrated and passed on to future generations.


Mayor Dale Janway supported Brooks' recommendation, and a nominating committee, consisting of a diverse group of local leaders selected the first 15 names in 2017.

Museum staff quickly went to work developing the exhibits. Family members of inductees and inductees themselves generously donated artifacts that highlight some of Carlsbad's most esteemed individuals.

On August 1, 2017. historian and educator Jed Howard became the first person to be formally inducted into the Carlsbad Hall of Fame. Congressional Medal of Honor recipient Alejandro Ruiz and race car driver Dick Harrell were inducted on Veteran's Day, 2017.

Inductions are being held to suit the schedules of family members. Some of the exhibits are still in development.

Membership (as of 2018)

- Ray Anaya A philanthropist, probation officer and Eddy County's first Hispanic sheriff. He and his wife founded Christmas Anonymous.
- John Andrews A member of the New Mexico humanities Council. Widely considered to be one of the world's leading experts on Shakespeare.
- Shane Andrews A baseball standout who played for the Expos, Cubs, and Boston Red Sox.
- Ralph Bowyer A legendary coach at Carlsbad High School who is also known for his artistic ability and his pursuit of integration.
- Bruce Cabot An actor best remembered for his role as Jack Driscoll in King Kong (1933).
- Charles Eddy A Pioneer who first arrived in the area in 1881 with his brother John. Charles is credited with founding the community that became Carlsbad.
- Sam Etcheverry A football legend who was especially popular in the Canadian Football League.
- **Cruz Fernandez** Was the first Hispanic graduate from Carlsbad High and one of the states finest police officers.
