# FOCUSING UPON THE CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES OF THE 2006-7 SEASON

As we prepare for the second half of our current fiscal year, we're keenly aware of how important it is to have strong support from a diverse and active membership. In the July 2006 issue of *ESU News & Announcements* we expressed gratitude to those who have assisted us financially in recent years. We're deeply obliged to everyone who contributes to our educational and cultural outreach, and above all to those who do so at levels that permit us to offer events and services that transcend those functions which can be sustained by ordinary operating funds.

Without the substantial underwriting we've received from the MORRIS AND GWENDOLYN CAFRITZ FOUNDATION, for example, we'd have been unable to continue our annual SHAKESPEARE COMPETITION FOR THE NATIONAL CAPITAL REGION. Under this rubric we have arranged several workshops each year for teachers and students in the metropolitan area. In recent springs we've bestowed fellowships for summer study in Great Britain upon several of the outstanding instructors who've helped prepare participants for the proceedings. We've given monetary prizes to the three contestants who've finished with the highest ratings. And we've sent the winners of our local COMPETITION to LINCOLN CENTER in New York, where those students have had a chance to take part in national festivities and compete for an intensive, expense-paid drama course at one of London's most prestigious academies for aspiring theatre professionals.

We're indebted in similar ways to the MARPAT FOUNDATION, which granted seed money for a strengthening and restructuring of *ENGLISH IN ACTION*, a much-praised endeavor that provides tutoring in conversational English for those in our midst who need help adapting to a language and a society that are unfamiliar to them. This service depends upon a dedicated corps of volunteers, each willing to donate an hour a week or more to informal sessions that enable newcomers to become familiar with the idioms and nuances of a discourse which can be quite difficult to master. For that reason we owe at least as much to

our thoughtful, civic-minded **ESU** tutors as we do to those who reinforce the framework for their ministrations. We're exceedingly grateful to **Lynn Humphries** and **Ruby Mathews**, two members of the branch who have inherited the reins from **Diana Nicholson** and now work with a long-involved **EIA Committee** to oversee this complex operation. Lynn and Ruby are constantly on the lookout for additional volunteers, and anyone who'd like to learn more about **ENGLISH IN ACTION** may get in touch with them through the **ESU WASHINGTON** office.

It goes without saying that we're eager to maintain the vitality of efforts such as these, which we regard as pivotal to our mission. At the same time, moreover, we're seeking to expand our influence through the flourishing of additional undertakings.

One has to do with an annual ALISTAIR COOKE MEMORIAL LECTURE, which we helped inaugurate in July 2005 with a DARTMOUTH HOUSE presentation by Senator John McCain. This event was broadcast over BBC RADIO 4, and it will be followed a few months hence by a sequel in the same venue with another distinguished speaker. The idea for this series originated with our most philanthropic Vice-President, Dr. Marjorie J. Williams, and we're deeply gratified by the way it has evolved.

Another initiative relates to the Churchill monument that **ESU WASHINGTON** placed in front of the **BRITISH EMBASSY** in 1966. In collaboration with the international **CHURCHILL CENTRE** and the **BRITISH-AMERICAN BUSINESS ASSOCIATION**, we hosted a lustrous 40th-anniversary dinner in April at the **WILLARD HOTEL**. We're now taking steps to establish a *CHURCHILL FORUM* to ensure that Sir Winston's heritage remains vibrant, and we expect to co-sponsor another high-profile symposium in the near future.

Meanwhile, in tandem with the **SHAKESPEARE GUILD** and a wide spectrum of other institutions, we're assuming a significant role in a salute to **SHAKESPEARE IN WASHINGTON** that will dominate our region's arts calendar in 2007. If all goes well, this festival will open up promising avenues for further exploration. In the interim it will afford the context for a fascinating parade of **SPEAKING OF SHAKESPEARE** engagements, several of which you'll be hearing about in the weeks to follow.

As we venture forth, we fervently hope that you will be so kind as to share your thoughts about the **ESU** and its objectives. We'd love to know about offerings that would be of high interest to you, venues you'd find appealing, luminaries you'd enjoy hearing and meeting, and highlights you'd like to see on our schedule of events. We're especially keen to receive any suggestions you may have about ways in which the **ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION** could be more effective. And we'd welcome anything you'd like to do to help us realize our full potential as a nonprofit organization.

We recognize, of course, that a broad array of other causes vie for your attention, particularly at this point in the calendar. We'll be very thankful, therefore, if you bear **ESU WASHINGTON** in mind as you ponder tax-deductible donations for 2006 and 2007. We're happy to announce that, in response to a generous \$25,000 challenge gift from **Marjorie Williams**, our Board of Directors has pledged itself to matching funds in the same amount. We're now soliciting contributions in the same range from the membership at large, hoping thereby to eliminate a deficit pattern that has persisted over several budget cycles. Only if we succeed with this campaign can we embrace new aspirations, among them a significant initiative that is now being explored with **ESU PARIS**.

Since 1920, when it originated in response to a parallel organization that had been established two years earlier in Great Britain, the English-Speaking Union of the United States has sought to foster social and cultural cohesion through the resources and traditions of a language that has become increasingly indispensable as a means of international communication. Through a diverse array of offerings, some of which are shared with audiences around the world through radio and TV, the national capital's ESU endeavors to advance a noble mission.

### In Memory of Dick Howland

On October 24 the ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION lost one of its most venerable patrons. Dr. RICHARD H. HOWLAND, OBE, 96, was a classical archaeologist and an imaginative leader who served as the first president of the NATIONAL TRUST FOR HISTORIC PRESERVATION, as a pioneer for the SMITHSONIAN STUDY TOURS program, and as founder of the SOCIETY OF ARCHITECTURAL HISTORIANS. A prominent socialite as well as a widely recognized scholar, Dr. Howland was a prime mover in the ESU WASHINGTON project that resulted in the memorial to Sir Winston Churchill which stands in front of the BRITISH EMBASSY. He was also responsible for bequests that benefited not only the ESU but a number of related organizations. We're forever in his debt.
