

of the universities of Bonn and Geneva, with a master's degree from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy at Tufts University in Massachusetts, Mr. Ischinger served from 1973 to 1975 as a member of the staff of the UNITED NATIONS Secretary General. He then joined the GERMAN FOREIGN SERVICE, where he held key postings in Paris and elsewhere before he presented his ambassadorial credentials to President Bush and assumed the position



he has occupied since July 2001. Between 1995 and 1998, as his nation's **DIRECTOR GENERAL FOR POLITICAL AFFAIRS**, Mr.

Following a stint in the Central Band of the ROYAL AIR FORCE, he began playing for the BRITISH BROADCASTING COR-

PORATION. He went on to travel with the **CARL ROSA** and **D'OYLY CARTE** opera companies. Mr. March is a well-known journalist and on-air personality, and he is a consultant to

SQUIRES GATE MUSIC LTD., an international mail-order service. He contributes articles and reviews to a number of periodicals, among them *GRAMOPHONE*, where he focuses primarily upon

reissues of earlier recordings. With the rise of the Internet and of satellite transmission, and with the proliferation of digital technology for downloading, transferring, and listening to recorded performances, Mr. March has found

A LUNCHEON WITH E. R. BRAITHWAITE, THE MAN WHO WROTE *TO SIR, WITH LOVE*

February is **BLACK HISTORY MONTH**, and the **ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION** is delighted to collaborate with the **WNDC** on a special get-together with one of the **ESU**'s most eminent constituents, a magnetic figure who, as a young man from the Third World who'd just completed a prestigious doctorate in physics from the University of Cambridge, discovered to his consternation that

the color of his skin prevented him from landing a job in his chosen field. Before long E. R. BRAITHWAITE found his true calling in an embattled secondary school in east London, where he tamed a classroom of unruly adolescents, refocused their energies, and prepared them for fulfilling lives in a society that had largely dismissed them as unworthy of its attention. In 1959 he published *To Sir, WITH LOVE*, a moving account of his trial by fire. It soon became an international best-



seller, and it provided film actor SIDNEY POITIER with one of his most poignant roles. Dr. Braithwaite went on to publish other

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eloquent books, among them *A Kind of Homecoming* (1961), *Paid Servant* (1962), *Collected Short Stories* (1964), *Choice of Straws* (1965), *Reluctant Neigh-bors* (1972), and *Honorary White* (1975), and

in due course he was asked to represent his native Guyana as its first **AMBASSADOR TO THE UNITED NATIONS**.

Dr. Braithwaite has taught at several universities, among them NYU, FLORIDA STATE, GEORGE MASON, and HOWARD, and those who have had the good fortune to hear him speak recognize him as one of the globe's most powerful emissaries for the English language. During a wide-ranging conversation with the ESU's JOHN ANDREWS he'll talk, among other things, about a soon-to-be-completed stage adaptation of *To Sir, With Love*, to be produced in London's West End. He'll also be happy to respond to questions and to inscribe paperback copies of the latest edition of *To Sir, With Love*, which will be on hand for purchase.
