


THEY MADE AMERICA: TWO CENTURIES OF INNOVATION A Presentation and Book-Signing by Renowned Author SIR HAROLD EVANS

We're pleased to open the new year with the authority behind a handsome volume that inspired an acclaimed **PBS** series. *They Made America* is **SIR HAROLD EVANS'** penetrating sequel to *The American Century*, a best-seller that was dubbed Book of the Year by both the *New York Times*



and *Publishers Weekly*. Sir Harold will discuss and inscribe copies of his tribute to "Two Centuries of Innovation," which will be available for purchase, at the first of two January luncheons to be co-hosted by the **Woman's National Democratic Club**. Before he and his wife, **Tina Brown**, moved to the United States, Sir Harold presided over the venerable *Times* of London. His was a reign of excellence (1967-82) that prompted his fellow journalists to honor him as Britain's most distinguished

editor. From 1990 to 1997 he served as chief executive of RANDOM HOUSE. Between 1997 and 1999 he guided the fortunes of several leading magazines, among them *Atlantic Monthly* and *U.S. News & World Report*. He'll supply illuminating vignettes from an overview on technology that carries us "From the Steam Engine to the Search Engine."







As the man who pioneered "The New Historicism" and enlightened us with such influential studies as *Renaissance Self-Fashioning* (1980), *Shakespearean Negotiations* (1988), *Learning to Curse* (1990), and *Hamlet in Purgatory* (2001), **STEPHEN GREENBLATT** had already established himself as one of today's most widely recognized experts on the Early

Modern era before he compiled his warmly received *Norton Shakespeare* anthology of the complete works in 1997. It was by no means shocking, then, that when he applied his vast erudition to a life and times of Shakespeare, the result would be a narrative that has received enthusiastic notices in all the key media. Nor is it astonishing that a work which has been lauded by such acute critics as *The New Yorker's* Adam Gopnik received a coveted nomination for the **National Book Award**. After many fruitful years in the **University of California at Berkeley**, Dr. Greenblatt is now Cogan University Professor of



the Humanities at **Harvard University**. Copies of his latest contribution to our understanding of the globe's most revered poet and dramatist will be on hand for purchase and inscription.

Born in Japan, where her parents served as missionaries, she devoted much of her varied career to the Foreign Service; she was also a mainstay at the ATLANTIC COUNCIL OF THE UNITED STATES and at the INTERNATIONAL STUDENT HOUSE.
