



HISTORIAN TAYLOR BRANCH CELEBRATES THE LEGACY OF MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR.

TAYLOR BRANCH, eminent recipient of one of the MacArthur Foundation's proverbial "genius awards," has also been honored with a Pulitzer Prize and with the National Humanities Medal.



In 1988 he published *Parting the Waters: America in the King Years, 1954-63*, the first volume of his magisterial trilogy on the Civil Rights Movement. In 1998 he came out with volume two, *Pillar of Fire: America in the King Years, 1963-65*. Now, on the eve of **Black History Month 2006**, he's issued the concluding installment of what is widely regarded as a definitive survey, *At Canaan's Edge: America in the King Years, 1965-68*. A native of Atlanta, Mr. Branch became commit-

ted to his life's work while attending the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in the 1960s. He now lives with his wife and children in Baltimore. In addition to all the books and articles he has given us, Mr. Branch has furthered an important cause in other ways; during the Clinton administration, for example, he served as an informal White House advisor on racial matters. Mr.

Branch has observed that "almost as color defines vision itself, race shapes the cultural eye—what we do and do not notice, the reach of empathy and the alignment of response." In a recent interview he noted that


