
#### A New Perspective on Wordsworth and Coleridge

SHAKESPEARE COMPETITION whose winner will receive a scholarship to the *Midsummer Conservatory Program* at the BRITISH AMERICAN DRAMA ACADEMY in Oxford.



Providing a brief overview on this remarkable institution, and going on to describe its place in the international Anglican community, will be a noted leader, DR. WESLEY SAMUEL WILLIAMS JR.







#### JUAN WILLIAMS SOUNDS OFF ON WHAT HE DECRIES AS PHONY 'VICTIMHOOD'

Feeling that many African-American leaders have departed from key tenets of the civilrights movement, NATIONAL PUBLIC RADIO correspondent JUAN WILLIAMS has decided that it's time to challenge an emphasis on "victimhood" that he criticizes as selfdestructive. In ENOUGH, he takes aim at a "culture of failure" that is "undermining Black America." 

ROGER REES achieved stardom in the title part of the ROYAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY's epic 8-hour rendering of Dickens' *Life and Adventures of Nicholas Nickleby*, for which he collected both an Olivier Award and a Tony. He went on to create the leading roles in the original London productions of



two Tom Stoppard hits, *The Real Thing* and *Hapgood*. On Broadway Mr. Rees has starred in *Indiscretions*, *A Man of No Importance*, *The Rehearsal*, and *Uncle Vanya*. Mr. Rees is a director and writer as well as a versatile actor, and he spent two decades as a member of the ROYAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY, performing such leading roles as the title character in *Hamlet*. He now presides over one of America's

most respected arts institutions, the WILLIAMSTOWN THEATRE FESTIVAL. A popular figure in TV series such as *Cheers* (where

he earned plaudits as Kirstie Alley's suitor, an English tycoon named Robin Colcord) and *The West Wing* (where he played Lord John Marbury, the British Ambassador), as well as in films like
