American heritage whose indispensable contributions to the special relationship between the U.K. and the U.S. are power-

fully evoked by a larger-than-life statue of the United Kingdom's wartime leader that the ESU placed in front of the Embassy compound on April 9, 1966.

During a gala at the WILLARD HOTEL which occurred two days after the 40th anniversary of that dedication ceremony, the ESU joined the BRITISH-AMERICAN BUSINESS ASSOCIATION and the CHURCHILL CENTRE to commemorate sculptor William McVey's monument and take stock of Sir Winston's enduring




heritage. Popular news anchor Gordon Peterson led a panel that included aerospace executive John W. Douglass, journalist H. Finlay Lewis, British diplomat Dominic Martin, and UPI correspondent Martin Walker, and their cogent remarks were supplemented by eloquent messages from such key figures as Lady Soames, the Prime Minister's daughter, and Susan Eisenhower, granddaughter of Churchill's comrade in arms.

It proved to be a scintillating dinner, and those who arranged it are now intent upon establishing an annual CHURCHILL FORUM.

A NEW STUDY OF THE LIFE AND CAREER OF PHYSICIST J. ROBERT OPPENHEIMER

about and sign copies of American Prometheus: The Triumph and Tragedy of J. Robert Oppenheimer. Winner of the 2005 National Book Critics Circle Award and the 2006 Pulitzer Prize, this fascinating volume tells the story of a man who is often described as the "Father of the Atomic Bomb." Mr. Bird and Mr. Sherwin spent more than twenty-five years conducting interviews and sifting through archival records, and the result of their meticulous research is

a narrative that reveals both the exhilaration of discovery and the anxieties and personal misfortunes that emanated from a

brilliant scientist's realization that what he had wrought could have incalculable consequences for a fragile planet and all of its inhabitants. According to the **Boston Globe**, this is "the first

biography to give full due to Oppenheimer's extraordinary complexity." It "stands as an Everest among the mountains of books on the bomb project and Oppenheimer, and is an achievement not likely to be surpassed or equaled." Previous studies by KAI BIRD include *The Chairman: John J. McCloy*, *The Making of the American Establishment*, and *The Color of Truth: McGeorge Bundy and William Bundy, Brothers in Arms*. Mr. Bird's co-author, MARTIN J. SHERWIN, is a professor of history at Tufts University. His book *A World Destroyed: Hiroshima and its Legacies* won the Stuart L. Bernath Prize and the American History Book Prize.
