



dures finally provoked enough concern to bring his proceedings to a halt. A gifted teacher as well as an observer who has long enjoyed the admiration of his peers, Mr. Johnson holds the Knight Chair in Journalism at the University of Maryland.

REMEMBERING BRITISH EVACUEES TO NORTH AMERICA DURING WORLD WAR II

Three years ago broadcaster MICHAEL HENDERSON talked to us about *Forgiveness* as a means of *Breaking the Chain of Hate* in social and political affairs. We're pleased to note that he'll be



back to introduce and inscribe copies of See You After the Duration: The Story of British Evacuees to North America in World War II. This memoir illuminates a key aspect of Anglo-American relations that has received little attention: the help that citizens of the United States and Canada provided by offering safe havens for the children of families in the United Kingdom who had no choice but to remain at home during the bombings that devastated many of their communities in the early 1940s. According

to **Sir Christopher Meyer**, Her Majesty's Ambassador to the United States from 1997 to 2003, "Michael Henderson tells us in a fascinating narrative, filled with adventure, about the drama and

sadness of children taken from their parents to a foreign land for their own safety. One of the things I liked most about this

book is the light it casts on some of the nooks and crannies of wartime North American life." In a moving foreword, Sir Martin Gilbert, renowned for his eloquence as biographer of Sir Winston Churchill, observes that "for those who were not part of


