Since June 2002 COLIN McCorquodale has chaired the branch of the ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION that serves the capital city of the United Kingdom. Located at DARTMOUTH HOUSE, the ESU's international headquarters, ESU LONDON is a vibrant metropolitan chapter with strong local and regional programming and with outreach efforts that spread its influence to such distant locations as Mongolia,



Madagascar, and Tajikistan. As befits a man who spent most of his career in the travel industry, Mr. McCorquodale is an interna-

A DIALOGUE WITH BRITISH NOVELIST AND PLAYWRIGHT MICHAEL FRAYN

MICHAEL FRAYN, the British author of such dramatic classics as Alphabetical Order (1975), Clouds (1976), Donkey's Years (1977), Make or Break (1980), Noises Off (1982), Benefactors (1984), *Copenhagen* (1998), and *Democracy* (2003), will be in town Tuesday, November 7, to receive the JOHN McGOVERN AWARD IN LITERATURE from the COSMOS CLUB. Happily, he'll be staying an extra day, and he has graciously agreed to take part in a discussion not only of his award-winning theatrical works but of such novels as The Tin Men (1965), The Russian Interpreter (1966), Towards the End of the Morning (1967), A Landing on the Sun (1991), Headlong (1999), and Spies (2002). He may also talk about a nonfiction title, *The Human* Touch: Our Part in the Creation of the Universe (2006). Mr.

Frayn's many honors include the Somerset Maugham Award, the Whitbread Novel Award, and the Commonwealth Writers Prize for fiction (as well as an appearance on the short list for the Booker Prize), and the Evening Standard and Tony awards for drama. He's also earned an Emmy for First and Last (1989), a TV film, and written



the screenplay for Clockwise (1986), a brilliant motion picture that starred John Cleese. We hope you'll join us for a session to

GARRY WILLS AND BILL PRESS EXPLORE A NEW BOOK ABOUT THE APOSTLE PAUL

It would be difficult to identify a more prolific intellectual than Garry Wills. Best known to many of his admirers for Lincoln at Gettysburg: The Words that Remade America (1992), a

best-seller that won the Pulitzer Prize, Mr. Wills is equally familiar for his incisive articles and commentary in such influential periodicals as the **New York** Times and the New York Review of Books. In January 2005, as a guest on C-SPAN2's In Depth program for BookTV, Mr. Wills responded to admirers' questions about volumes such as Inventing America: Jefferson's Declaration of Independence (1978), George Washington and the



Enlightenment (1984), Reagan's America: Innocents at Home (1987), Under God: Religion and American Politics (1990), Papal Sin: Structures of Deceit (2000), Venice: Lion City (2001), and Why I am a Catholic (2002). In a study which re-

minded us that he began his academic career as a classical scholar with expertise in Greek and Latin texts, Mr. Wills published What Jesus Meant in March. He's now back with What Paul Meant, a sequel about the Apostle who did so much to help the early church define the implications of the Gospels.

We're pleased that Mr. Wills will be joined in conversation by BILL PRESS, a thinker who spent several years in preparation for what he expected to be a vocation in the Roman Catholic clergy. A former host of CNN's *Crossfire* and of MSNBC's

Buchanan and Press, this engaging interviewer presides over a morning talk show on SIRIUS satellite radio and writes a weekly column for TRIBUNE MEDIA SERVICES. In his witty Spin This! (an outgrowth of The Spin Room, a CNN feature he co-hosted for several months in 2000 with Tucker Carlson), Mr. Press scrutinizes the English that public-relations specialists



bring to their interpretations of current politics. He is a frequent guest on cable offerings such as CNN's *Reliable Sources*.

overhaul of the author's remarkable surveys of casual, idiosyncratic, and colloquial usage. American popular culture is a rapidly evolving phenomenon, and nothing reflects its course more eloquently than its fast-moving slang. Musicians, athletes, politi-

cians, and bloggers — not to mention demographic developments in particular hotspots — are contributing to language growth, and there is no one today with a more acute ear for the phrase that epitomizes a new lifestyle or signals the beginning of

a fad. Selected by no less an authority than William Safire as one of the best books of the year in its first edition, *Slang* remains an essential companion for anyone who wishes to keep up with contemporary American society. We're co-hosting this event with the WOMAN'S NATIONAL DEMOCRATIC CLUB, and we're pleased to observe that copies of Mr. Dickson's volume will be available for purchase and for inscription by its author.



ARE YOU AWARE THAT YOU CAN WATCH ESU PROGRAMS ON C-SPAN'S BOOK TV?

If you subscribe to digital cable television, the odds are that you can watch ESU WASHINGTON offerings over C-SPAN2's weekend Book TV service.
