royal family. HRH PRINCESS MICHAEL OF KENT is the wife of Queen Elizabeth's first cousin. She is also a charming lecturer and the author of two nonfiction volumes, CROWNED IN A FAR COUNTRY: Portraits of Eight Royal Brides and CUPID AND THE KING: Five Royal Paramours. She'll discuss and sign copies of THE SERPENT AND THE MOON: Two Rivals for the Love of a Renaissance King. This riveting narrative explores a romantic triangle that involved two of the Princess' ancestors, Catherine de' Medici, the spouse of Henri II of France, and Diane de Poitiers,

the King's mistress. Catherine, we learn, was an envious, fearful, duplicitous woman whose opponents dubbed her "La Serpente." Diane was a stunning beauty who cultivated her namesake's persona as Goddess of the Moon.

BEATLEMANIA: FORTY YEARS ON FROM THE INVASION OF 1964 ESU Joins BABA and the British Council for an Event at the ROTUNDA

When **THE BEATLES** arrived in February 1964 for the first of two visits to America, they brought a sound that hadn't been heard before. By the time they departed for Liverpool two weeks later, they'd initiated a transforma-



tion in style, sensibility, and popular culture that went far beyond their captivating music. To mark the 40th anniversary of that pivotal moment, we're returning to the scene of a crime, a venue that made news when an enraptured fan created an international incident by clipping a lock of Ringo's hair. Helping us appreciate the Beatles' impact will be three authorities on the group. MARTIN GOLDSMITH, former host of NPR's Performance Today, will draw upon the details in his book THE BEATLES COME TO AMERICA. Journalist LARRY KANE will recall his three unforgettable weeks

as a touring insider with the charismatic mopheads, an experience he has chronicled in *Ticket to Ride*. WETA's irrepressible ROBERT AUBRY DAVIS will lead the discussion, and if necessary, preserve order. In all likelihood he and Mr. Goldsmith will conjure up memories from their years in the studio of *Songs for Aging Children*, a nostalgic Sunday afternoon radio feature.
