



And both can be counted on to entertain us with witty reminders of the debts we owe to personalities as varied and colorful as Mae West, Mark Twain, and Yogi Berra.

On Thursday, November 1, attendees will enjoy an afternoon SHAKESPEARE FESTIVAL that includes a panel discussion with John Andrews, president of the SHAKESPEARE GUILD, Ralph Cohen, executive director of the AMERICAN SHAKESPEARE CENTER, and Michael LoMonico, senior consultant on national education at the FOLGER SHAKESPEARE LIBRARY. That will be followed Friday, November 2, with a Focus on JAMESTOWN, to be highlighted by a luncheon conversation with Dr. James Kelly, director of museums at the VIRGINIA HISTORICAL SOCIETY, who will discuss Three North American Beginnings: Jamestown 1607, Ouebec 1608, and Santa Fe 1609. Saturday, November 3, will be devoted to INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY, and it will include both a morning symposium on Churchill and the English-Speaking PEOPLES (with Allen Packwood, director of the Churchill ARCHIVES CENTRE in Cambridge, and Celia Sandys, granddaughter of Sir Winston and author of numerous books and articles about that eminent statesman) and an afternoon dialogue between Mrs. Valerie Mitchell, secretary-general of the ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION at Dartmouth House in London, and William R. Miller, chairman of the ENGLISH-SPEAKING UNION OF THE UNITED STATES and head of the ESU's International Council. Proceedings will draw to a close on Sunday, November 4, with a plenary session in the hotel and a liturgically evocative service at Richmond's venerable St. John's Church.

Among the luminaries to be involved in various components of the conference will be **Lord Watson** of Richmond-upon-Thames, who will deliver a keynote address about *Jamestown and the Voyage of English*, and two of Virginia's most admired public figures, **Governor Tim Kaine** and **Senator John Warner**. Our gracious hosts are doing their best to provide something for everyone, and we hope that dozens of constituents from **ESU WASHINGTON** will be on hand for this illustrious gathering.
